GARDENING.

SOW beans for transplanting in March; cabbage at the close of the month, and peas on a sheltered border. The first interval of open weather should be taken advantage of to get in any bulbs which may remain unplanted. Train neatly creepers, such as honey-suckle, rose, vine, and clematis. Mignonette, stocks, &c., should be sown in pots, and sweet peas, and a few hardy annuals on a warm border. Protect choice bulbs against frost.

INVERARY CASTLE.

THIS famous seat of the ducal house of Argyll is situated about a quarter of a mile to the north of the county town of Argyllshire. It is a handsome square edifice, built between 1744 and 1761, by the third duke, Archibald, and restored in 1879-80. It consists of two storeys and a sunk floor, with round over-topping towers at the four corners. Many interesting and valuable relics were destroyed by a fire which took place in 1877.

GARDENING.

SOW peas the first favourable opportunity. Sow long-pod beans for a main crop, and early radishes in a dry and sheltered situation. Plant onions for seed. Make new plantations of strawberries if these were not made in July or August. Prune and tie raspberries, and make fresh plantations. In mild weather expose freely carnations and auriculas; plant also ranunculus roots. Prune such roses as are of robust growth.

CORK.

CORK is generally termed the capital of the south of Ireland. It is situated on the banks of the River Lee, which after passing the city widens out into the splendid bay or inlet of the sea containing the Great Island, on which is the town of Cove, now changed into Queens-town. The southern extremity of this inlet is called the Cove of Cork. Cork is said to have been founded by the Danes in the ninth century.

GARDENING.

SOW peas for succession. The first favourable weather, transplant in rows across a warm border the beans from the autumn-sown beds. Sow cabbage on a warm border during the first or second week for summer or autumn supply. Sow broad-leaved London leeks and lettuce. Make new plantations of mint. Sow onions. Sow parsley. Sow a few of the hardiest annuals about the end of the month; thin out some of those sown in autumn.

MENAI STRAITS.
THE Menai Straits, which separate the island of Anglesea from the mainland, run east-north-east from its southern extremity to Bangor, a distance of thirteen miles, and there widen out into Beaumaris Bay. Communication between Anglesea and the mainland was formerly maintained by ferry-boats, but a suspension bridge was constructed by Government in 1825, and railway communication was established in 1850 by means of the famous Britannia Tubular Bridge. This bridge cost about £602,000.

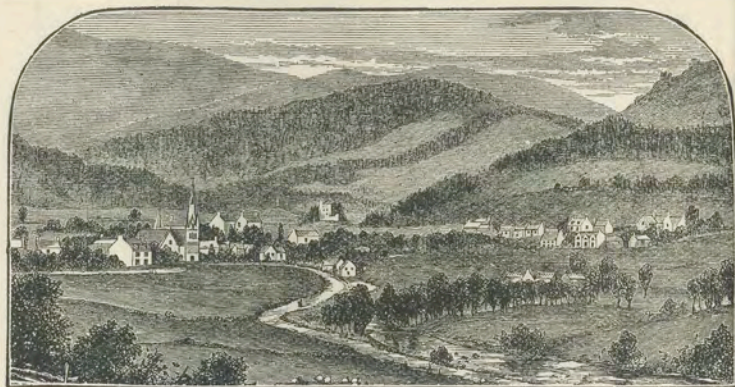
GARDENING.

IN the first fortnight plant the second early crop of potatoes, and the main crop about the end of the month. Sow beans for succession. Sow red beetroot in the second week. About the same time sow borecole or Scotch greens, and Brussels sprouts. Sow lettuce for succession once a month. Plant in a shady place slips of sage, thyme, rue, and other herbs. In the fruit garden proceed with grafting. Make the main sowing of hardy annuals this month.

PENARTH.

THE town of Penarth, near Cardiff, owes much to the enterprise of its inhabitants, and has grown in comparatively few years from insignificance to importance. Its natural position on the southern borders of the vast South Wales coalfield, and its magnificent dock, constructed at great expense, have brought it into prominence as a shipping port. It is also popular as a seaside resort, and is the residence of many of the merchants of the neighbouring town of Cardiff.

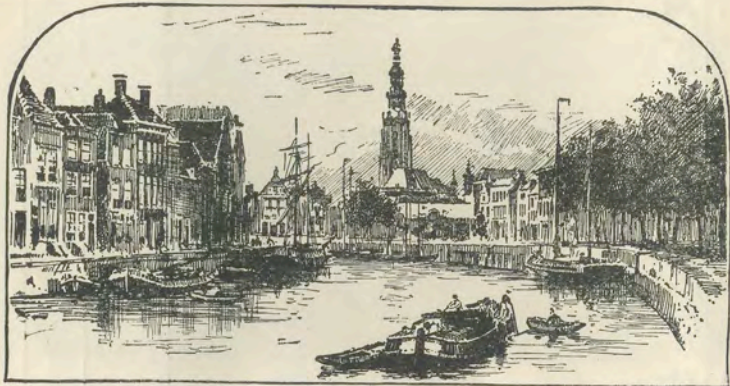
GARDENING.

HOE industriously all advancing crops. Sow peas for succession. Sow radishes, summer savory, spinach, and broccoli. Thin out early horn carrots. Sow cauliflower to come into use in October, and plant out those raised in March. Loosen the surface soil about onions, and plant out the autumn-sown ones during the first moist weather. Keep an eye on insects and destroy them.

CASTLETON.

THE straggling collection of houses known as Castleton of Braemar stands on a piece of irregular ground, where the turbulent stream of the Clunie rushes down to join the Dee. The village contains two excellent hotels, and two public halls erected by Lord Fife and the late Col. Farquharson respectively to commemorate the "Queen's Jubilee." On an eminence near the Invercauld Arms Hotel the Earl of Fife raised the standard of rebellion in 1715.

GARDENING.

MAKE the last sowing of peas and beans for the season. Sow radish and lettuce for succession. A main sowing of turnips may now be made. Thin carrots, hoeing deeply among them at the same time. Earth up celery. Sow cream-coloured kidney beans. Earth up potatoes afterwards. Destroy the black fly on cherry-trees, &c. Tender annuals sown in pots may be planted in the open borders. Hoe and rake shrubberies frequently.

MIDDELBURG.

THIS famous Dutch town, the ancient capital of the province of Zeeland, is situated in the middle of the island of Walcheren. It is mentioned as early as 1153, and receives the title of town in a charter granted it in 1227. It has all the characteristics of an old and worn-out place. One of the sights of Middelburg is the splendid town-house, for the most part erected in 1512-13. It is decorated with statues of the nobility of Holland.

EARTH up and stick peas, and earth up and top advancing beans. Plant the main crop of celery the first suitable weather. Sow lettuce for succession, the last crop of kidney beans, and a few of the turnip-rooted kind of radish. Stake scarlet beans. The main plantations of borecoles must now be made. This is the month for planting the principal crops of winter greens. Thin out annuals during showery weather.

PEMBROKE DOCK.

The seaport town of Pembroke occupies a rocky ridge on a navigable creek of Milford Haven. *Pater*, otherwise called Pembroke dock, which is rather a government ship-building than a commercial centre, is two miles from the town. The entire naval establishment embraces an area of eighty acres, and is surrounded by a high wall flanked by martello towers. The dockyard affords employment to about twenty-four thousand artisans. In Pembroke there is an interesting Norman church.

GARDENING.

SOW a few early horn carrots, and at the close of the month the main crop of winter spinach. About the end of the second week sow lettuce for standing through the winter. Earth up the earliest celery. Plant out the last crop of broccoli. Protect ripe fruit from wasps and insects. Remove all useless growths from vines. Remove annuals as soon as their flowers decay. Cut down raspberry canes which have ripened off their fruit.

LINLITHGOW PALACE.
ON the margin of the lake at Linlithgow stands Linlithgow Palace, a favourite seat of the kings of Scotland. The west side is the most ancient, and contains the room where Queen Mary was born on 7th December, 1542. The palace was reduced to its present ruinous condition by the English dragoons, under General Hawley, during the insurrection in 1745-46. Externally the building is rather heavy from the want of windows.

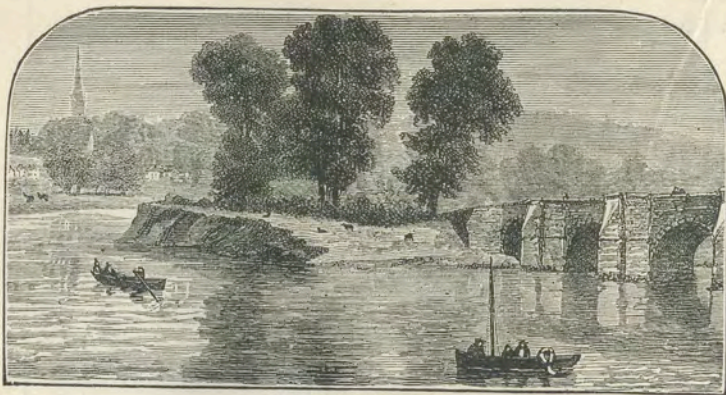

TAKE up potatoes as soon as they are ripe. Plant out coleworts. Plant out lettuces to stand till winter in sheltered situations. Gather any apples or pears which may ripen this month. Various hardy annuals if sown now will stand ordinary winters without protection. Take cuttings from China roses. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, Persian iris, narcissus, crown imperials, and dog's-tooth violets. Gather any desirable seeds whenever they ripen.

ROSS BRIDGE.

ROSS ISLAND, situated on the eastern shore of the Lower Lake of Killarney, is not properly an island, but a peninsula, though at high water it is difficult to reach it from the shore without having recourse to the bridge. In the neighbourhood is Ross Castle, from the summit of which a delightful view is obtained. This castle was built by one of the O'Donoghues. It is now in ruins, but occupies a beautiful and romantic situation.

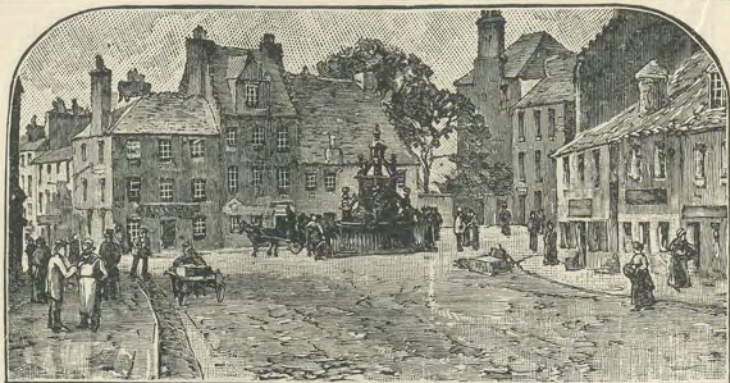

GARDENING.

CONTINUE to take up potatoes when the weather is suitable. Earth up celery in fine dry weather, and ridge or dig any ground as soon as it is vacant. Parsnips and carrots should be taken up when their tops turn yellow. Store apples and pears. Begin the pruning of gooseberry and currant bushes; transplant them about the end of the month. Strawberry beds should be top dressed with well-rotted manure.

LINLITHGOW.

THIS is an old burg, dating from the twelfth century, and till recently contained a number of old-fashioned houses which belonged to the Knights of St. John. It was in Linlithgow that David Hamilton, of Bothwell-haugh, shot the Regent Murray, as the latter was passing in procession through the town in 1570. The house from which the shot was fired belonged at that period to the Archbishop of St. Andrews; it was taken down a number of years ago. The parish church of St. Michael's is a beautiful specimen of the latest Scottish Gothic.

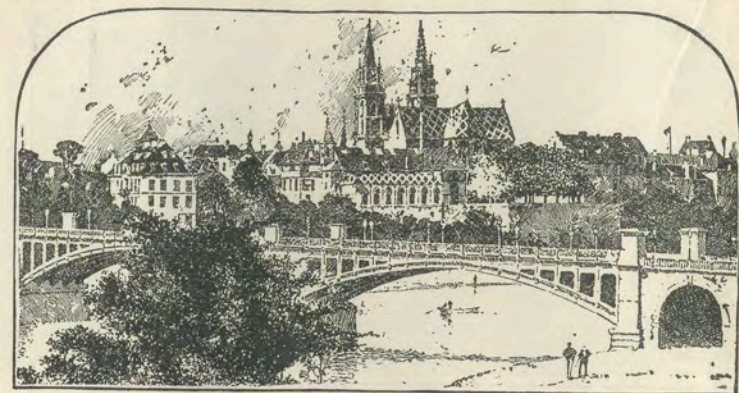

GARDENING.

DOUBLE blossoming frame peas may now be sown under a fence or wall. Sow early Lisbon beans in a sheltered situation and a light soil. This is the best month for pruning or transplanting. Prune and nail fruit trees on walls. Plant hyacinths the first week if possible. Plant tulips in the first week. This is the best month for making alterations in the flower garden, which has now quite lost its beauty.

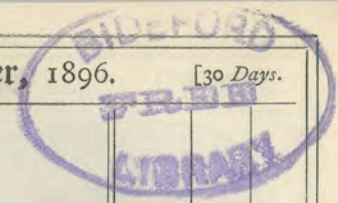
AT BASLE.

GARDENING.

ALL winter crops of vegetables should be kept free from dead leaves. Decayed flowers should be cut down. Dig the borders, taking particular care not to injure any bulbs. Proceed with pruning and nailing whenever an opportunity occurs. Inspect the fruit in the store-room at regular and frequent intervals, and remove whatever is found to be in a state of decay. Protect beds of tulips, hyacinths, &c.

BRAEMAR.

BRAEMAR is one of the best centres in Scotland for the pedestrian and mountaineer. It is surrounded by some of the wildest hill country in the north, through which a series of old drove roads and mountain passes converge from various directions upon Braemar, and thus enable the active searcher for the sublime and the beautiful in Nature to penetrate into remote and almost Alpine regions. The tourist, indeed, who has not visited Braemar cannot boast of acquaintance with all that is best in Scottish scenery.

This post is absolutely restricted to *bona fide trade patterns and samples*, 4 oz. are charged id., 4 to 6 oz. 1/2d., 6 to 8 oz. 2d.

Postage on Inland Registered Newspapers.

Prepaid Rate.—On each Registered Newspaper, whether posted singly or in a packet, the postage when prepaid is one halfpenny; but a packet containing two or more Registered Newspapers is not chargeable with a higher rate of postage than would be

Letter Post.

To and from all parts of the United Kingdom, the prepaid rates are:—

Post Cards.

Post Cards, bearing a halfpenny impressed stamp, are available for transmission between places in the United Kingdom only. They are sold at 10 for 5 1/2d., or of finer quality summs from 1s. up to 4s. For those for 1s. and 1s. 6d. the charge is 3/4d.; for 2s., 2s. 6d., 3s., 3s. 6d., 4s., 4s. 6d., 5s., 7s. 6d., 10s., 10s. 6d., it is 1d.; for 15s. and 20s. it is 1 1/2d. Broken amounts can be made up by postage stamps affixed to the face of an order. These notes must be cashed within three months.

Registration and Compensation.

By the prepayment of a parcel of two pence any postal packet (free of postage) may be registered to any place in the United Kingdom. Compensation will be given by the Postmaster-General up to a maximum limit of £50 for the loss and damage of Inland Registered postal packets of all kinds. The ordinary fee of ad. secures £5; 3d. £10; 4d. £15; 5d. £20; 6d. £25; 7d. £30; 8d. £35; 9d. £40; 10d. £45; 11d. £50. Registered letter envelopes are sold at all Post Offices.

Inland Book Post.

The Book Post rate is one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz. Every Book Packet must be posted either without a cover or in an unfastened envelope, or in an easily removable cover. No Book Packet may exceed 5 lbs. in weight, or 18 inches in length, 9 inches in width, and 6 inches in depth.

Inland Parcel Post.

At any Post-office in the United Kingdom, Parcels are now received for transmission at the following charges: not exceeding 1 lb., 3d., and 1 1/2d. for every additional pound up to 11 lbs. The length must not exceed 3 ft. 6 in.; length and girth combined 6 ft.

Postage on Inland Registered Newspapers.

Prepaid Rate.—On each Registered Newspaper, whether posted singly or in a packet, the postage when prepaid is one halfpenny; but a packet containing two or more Registered Newspapers is not chargeable with a higher rate of postage than would be

chargeable on a Book Packet of the same weight, viz. one halfpenny for every 2 oz., or fraction of 2 oz.

Money Orders for the United Kingdom.

Money Orders are issued in the United Kingdom at the rates:—
 For sums not exceeding £1, 2d.; £1 to £2, 3d.; £2 to £4, 4d.; £4 to £7, 5d.; £7 to £10, 6d.
 Money may now be sent by Telegraph Money Orders at the following rates:—
 For sums not exceeding £1, 4d.; £1 to £2, 6d.; £2 to £4, 8d.; £4 to £7, 10d.; £7 to £10, 1s.

Post Orders.

These orders are for certain fixed sums from 1s. up to 4s. For those for 1s. and 1s. 6d. the charge is 3/4d.; for 2s., 2s. 6d., 3s., 3s. 6d., 4s., 4s. 6d., 5s., 7s. 6d., 10s., 10s. 6d., it is 1d.; for 15s. and 20s. it is 1 1/2d. Broken amounts can be made up by postage stamps affixed to the face of an order. These notes must be cashed within three months.

Money Orders payable Abroad.

Money Orders, payable abroad, are issued in the United Kingdom at the following rates:—
 On sums not exceeding £2, 6d.
 Above £2, and not exceeding £5 1s. 0d.
 Above £5, and not exceeding £7, 1s. 6d.
 Above £7, and not exceeding £10 2s. 0d.

Post Office Telegraphs.

The charge for telegrams throughout the United Kingdom is 6d. for the first 12 words and 3/4d. for every additional word. Addresses are charged for.

Post Office Savings Banks.

No deposit of less than a shilling is received, nor any one, and not more than £50 in any one year. No further deposit is allowed when the amount standing in depositor's name amounts to £500, inclusive of interest. Interest is allowed at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent. (or sixpence in the pound) per annum—that is, at the rate of one halfpenny per pound per month. Deposits already made in other savings banks can be easily transferred to the Post Office. Separate accounts may be opened in the names of wife and children.

At every Post-office in the United Kingdom forms for making small deposits are issued gratuitously. Each form has twenty divisions, in each of which a penny postage stamp can be placed; when twelve are filled in, it is received at any Post-office Savings Bank as a shilling. Any person can invest, at any Post-office Savings Bank, small sums in Government Stock. Not more than £500 can be invested in any one year. The amount held by any one investor must not exceed £500. Annuities of up to £100 may be purchased, and insurances of from £5 to £100 may be effected through the Post Office Savings Bank.

FOREIGN TELEGRAMS.

The address of the receiver must be paid for, and must not consist of less than two words, a name and a town. Example: "Hercules, Bombay." The address of the sender is charged for if transmitted; if not to be transmitted, it must be written at the foot of the form.

The charges vary from 2d. a word to Belgium, France, Germany, and Holland, 2 1/2d. to Luxembourg, 3d. to Algeria, Austria, and Italy, 3 1/2d. to Denmark and Norway, 4d. to Spain, to 1s. 0d. to the United States, 4s. 7d. upwards to Australia, 5s. and 5s. 2d. to New Zealand, and 1rs. 2d. to British Guiana.

In EUROPEAN Telegrams the maximum length allowed for a single word is 15 letters; in EXTRA-EUROPEAN Telegrams, 10 letters; any additional letters being counted and charged for as extra words at the rate of 15 or 10 letters respectively to the word.

The Months in the above Table are calculated at only Twelve Months to the Year. If the Yearly Wages be Guineas instead of Pounds, for each Guinea add one Penny to each Month, or one Farthing to each week. Thus, Six-pence per Year are Ten Shillings per Month; but if the Wages be Six Guineas, add one Penny for each Guinea that is Sixpence, and it will then be Ten Shillings and Sixpence per Month. In like manner, by adding Six Farthings to each Week, the Wages will be Two Shillings and Fivepence per Week.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT AND THEIR CONSTITUENCIES.

THE fourth and last session of the 13th Parliament of Her Majesty's reign (elected in July, 1892) came to a close on Saturday, the 6th of July, 1895, and the House of Commons was dissolved by proclamation on Monday, the 8th. The Election throughout the United Kingdom for a New Parliament commenced on the 12th of July, and terminated on the 7th of August—the last of the constituencies to be polled being that of Orkney and Shetland.

We give here a summary of the constitution of the House of Commons:—
